

Turn right on Ruus Road and proceed southeast for about 0.4 mile. Look for Calvary Baptist Church on your left.


Turn left into the driveway into the parking lot. Parking is available anywhere from the driveway to the back of the lot.

time to wait from one January to the next and too far to go to SinoCES or CEbit? Try the Southwest Computer Conference in easy-to-access San Diego.

Can you believe it? For eighteen consecutive years a goodsized group of folks have had the good sense to come in neither does anyone else.

A word from Abby about passwords. Three. That is, you need three of them. One for e-mail accounts (yes, you want more than one so that you can control how and when you manage different kinds of e-mail), one for banking and only banking, and one for everything else.

out of the Southern California summer sun and bury themselves in piles of silicon and how-to discussions.

Starting Friday afternoon with Abby Stokes, author of Is This Thing On? and running through Sunday noon, a variety of keynotes and concurrent workshops provided the opportunity to find out what's new at the end of Second Quarter 2011–and what's promised–in the world of technology.

Abby teaches the old-fashioned way: through stories and analogies. Her goal is to educate people so that they can make an informed choice about how they use technology, or choose not to. She discussed some of the basics of social networking.

Facebook is a Web site where people share whatever they want about themselves and can keep in touch with distant friends and relatives, almost in real time if they upload quickly. One caveat: you don't have to tell the truth and

Assume that everything you put on the Internet -- including on Facebook -- is public information. You can't control

who is going to forward what to whom, or when. Take it for granted that anything you send out is posted in REALLY BIG LETTERS or billboard-sized pictures on your front door or will be soon.

Twitter has a different structure than Facebook. Because of the limitation to 140 characters per message, abbreviations have become common, like "CUl8tr." Twitter doesn't have Friends. You Follow other people or they Follow you. As on Facebook, you have no obligation to tell the truth and no guarantee that anyone is telling you the truth or has not been hacked or impersonated.

Andy Marken of Markencom.com talked about the future of storage. (We'll use more, need even more, and become more vulnerable as storage moves Cloudward as a way of avoiding the restrictions of local physical media.)

Alex Eckelberry, General Manager of GFI, presented the new face of online security. You may have gotten to know familiar with the GFI flagship product, Vipre Antivirus, when it was offered by Sunbelt Software. It's still the same forward thinking product that identifies suspicious behavior even before malware or a specific invader has been identified, isolates it, and cleans your computer. GFI has recently acquired Sunbelt, but Alex is still with the product

and looking forward to adding Vipre Mobile for Android phones to the Vipre line-up. As cell phones become a popular platform, they become a popular target and Vipre is ready to address the challenge.

Matt Mardini of Wolverine Data showed off the Wolverine line of products digitize various other formats, including audio

tapes; film negatives, slides, and photos. The Wolverine portable scanner is really small enough to fit into your computer case along with your other gear. It works, easily converting a printed page to a JPG.

Thomas Ford, Global Communications Manager for Opera, presented the Norwegian browser. Currently there are about 2 billion people online. About 3% of them use Opera on different devices, including Wii, Ford trucks,

picture frames. Opera has more tools to do more things more easily and faster than other browsers. The company has made an effort to keep functionality while making it easier to use. Alternative browsers keep the big companies on their toes and honest.

Opera Mini operates on more cell phones than any other browser. Speed dial extension in the next version of Opera

lets you choose the instant access buttons you want to keep on top. Tab browsing started in Opera. Accidentally close a tab? Get all your history and info back out of the Trash Bin. In Opera 11 the user can group tabs. Hover over a tab and get a thumbnail description. An icon in the address bar tells the level of security on a page. Opera Turbo reduces the size of a page, speeding access -- especially helpful when on dial-up or a crowded WiFi location. Being small, Opera is challenged to try harder. The company can also be more agile and responsive to threats.

Evelyn Watts, Field Services Manager for Corel, blew everyone's sox off with her demonstrations of Corel graphics applications. With Painter 12 and a pressuresensitive graphics tablet, vou have at your fingertips the equivalent of a complete

palette of water colors, oils, acrylics, pencils, and charcoals. Except that your paints never dry out, you never run out of Burnt Ochre just before you finish painting the yellow brick road. Clean up is a snap, (or rather a mouse click) and there are no toxic solvents anywhere in the package. For those of us with less than artistic hands, Undo without wasting a single canvas or piece of paper. PaintShop Photo Pro X3 provides tools to repair or improve photos. Easily remove pesky power lines from scenery, or the proverbial ex from the group shot. For people who just must get work done, Corel Office

X5, WinZip 15, and PDF Fusion simplify work tasks and improve productivity.

What follows is a rather random selection of workshop offerings. For each one reported there were three that could not be covered. What a surprise. Not. Judy Taylour filled a room to overflowing by presenting a brief introduction

to some 25 free resources to make one's computing life safer and simpler (or more complicated as more options open up).

Shuly Patush of SafeTREC presented the SafeTREC solution to mobile safety and emergency access. Once the SafeTREC

safety network is set up, a single Panic Button-which can be set as any key-logs into the 24/7 network and appropriate problemsolving actions are set in motion. A text message can be sent in situations where talking might not be safe and an Escalation Code overrides other messages to indicate extreme danger where the speaker cannot talk.

The database lets a user

know the safety record of an area, very handy when in a strange city.

Gini Pedersen walked attendees through the basics of eBay and online auction bidding in general. EBay is not the only

auction site, just the best known. For example, there is YouBid. There are kinds of products that sell and those that don't on an auction site. The write up and picture are very important as is the feedback a seller accumulates, which buyers can use to evaluate the reliability of a seller. When shopping via a Search, it works best to start with a broad search and gradually refine it so that you don't cut out desirable items because you've used a different term than the seller. Be warned that neither eBay nor any other reputable company will send an e-mail asking you to click on a link or send personal information.

Bruce Aronson explained Tips and Tricks You Might Have Missed in Word 2010. The design plan for Word

2010 is that the tabs contain items most used moving left to right. And the operations move from left to right: What you do earlier in writing is most likely to show up under tabs more to the left. Styles have become Themes, under Page Layout. Users can build their own Themes. One can

do the same in MS Publisher, where it's called Schemes. Have you wondered why the new extension is .docx? Word now uses XML. Under the Review Tab, Compare clearly shows differences between two versions of a document. The computer, er Word, catches every single difference.

It never suffers from sleep deprivation or notices that it's being asked to work late on a Friday.

Abbas Mehdi, Product Manager for Iolo Technologies, joined a session of user group representatives who were discussing strategies for improving their club operations. He stressed how important Iolo feels user groups are to promoting information

about technology.

Developer and CEO Anthony Chang and his able assistant Kylee provided demonstrations and samples for attendees interested in learning or helping others learn.

Abbas Mehdi explained how System Mechanic from Iolo can keep bad stuff from invading and disabling our computers.

Thomas Ford took the opportunity to follow up his Opera with the opportunity for individual discussion with attendees. Since Opera is a free download, there is no product to sell.

versions of Nero, thissuitelooksata complete system for managing images. The free application Nero Kwik Media an easy and free media manager for your all your media: photos, music, video and data.

Matt Mardini followed up his general presentation with the opportunity



The Penguin Partition Linux for Human Beings

NewsBytes on the Linux front.

Kernel 3.0 (up from the venerable 2.6) was released three days after its scheduled

release date due to (Linus Torvolds says) a "subtle bug". Upcoming distro releases are already folding the new kernel in.

For those of you who don't follow OS soap opera, Linus Torvolds, the creator of the Linux kernel, retired from his engineering job and took up running the Linux Foundation full time a while back. He now devotes full time to Linux kernel development.

Torvolds calls this a celebration of the Linux kernel's twentieth birthday. It is not a major upgrade of the kernel, but is rather a rationalizing of the numbering system that has accumulated on version 2.6. Yes, there are improvements in the new kernel, but Torvolds reports these as "minor".

One of the improvements in the new kernel is refined ATI Radeon support. For those of you who don't follow the graphics card soap operas either, Radeon is the current series of graphics engines from ATI/AMD, and I am interested in these because I own several. Radeon support

for Linux is presently better than nVidia's (though this is always a moving target), and nVidia is presently suffering from driver problems on the Windoze platform as well. If you're shopping for a video card upgrade right now, ATI radeon is the better choice.

Want security? Try this: according to the DoD, "The Lightweight Portable Security distribution [of Linux] was created by the Software Protection Initiative under the direction of the Air Force Research Laboratory and the U.S. Department Of

Defense. The idea behind it is that government workers can use a CD-ROM or USB stick to boot into a tamper proof, pristine desktop when using insecure computers such as those available in hotels or a worker's own home. The environment that it offers should be largely resistant to Internet-borne security threats such as viruses and spyware, particularly when launched from read-

only media such as a CDROM. The LPS system does not mount the hard drive of the host machine, so leaves no trace of the user's activities behind." Sounds more clandestine than secure, but if the DoD thinks its safe, that's probably as good as computer security gets. Just what I need to run on those risky Windoze machines. . .

Diane also shared her Facebook page related to her job. She also signed up on the Facebook page of a few companies she's interested in. As a result, she gets information about some products she is interested in. She plans to Unfriend these companies when she's done shopping. But be warned,

Unfriending a person is considered serious social rejection. Diane also had several security caveats:

- Be sure you log out of each session so that no one can change your page or password.
- Beware of messages from people you know that purport to need money to cope with some kind of emergency.
- If you get an email that appears to be from your email provider that asks for both your address and password on the same form, be assured that it is a scam designed to hijack your account and lock you out.
- Facebook is particularly prone to sourcing scams.
- Before clicking on a link in an email or on a page, hover over the link WITHOUT clicking and look in the lower left corner of the screen to see the URL to which the link really goes.

Don Odle mentioned the Web Of Trust (WOT) Add-On for Firefox and Chrome. It color-codes site safety. Green for "probably OK," red for "don't go there."

Question for the experts: How do I hide and not install a Windows update? Answer: Right click on the link, choose Hide.

Question #2: How do I eliminate the message at the bottom of IE 9 to disable add-ons? Answer: Use Firefox, Opera, or Linux.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:45 pm.
