Meanwhile, back toward the more traditional


computers, Jan Fagerholm will be showing off a new interface that

Great Business Apps For Your iPad/iPod/iPhone




There's no shortage of impressive applications—some of them free—for Apple's popular family of mobile devices, and many of them are perfect for the home office worker or entrepreneur. Here are our favorite business-related mobile apps for the month. (Unless otherwise indicated, see the Apple App Store to purchase these apps.)

MyDirections



Planning ahead is always a good idea when on the road, but if you need directions fast, from wherever you happen to be, then MyDirections (free) from Aavees is the app for you. This app automatically provides directions from your current location to either a predefined destination or one you input manually. It's fast and easy to use, and you can even import destinations from your contacts list, which makes finding businesses, colleagues, partners, friends, and family easier than ever while on the road. Tapping the Options button also lets you access an FAQ for more information.

Norton Snap QR Code Reader



Do you trust every website lurking behind a QR code's seemingly random jumble of squares? You shouldn't, which is why Symantec's



got the right idea with the free Norton Snap QR Code Reader. Like any other QR reader, this app lets you scan QR codes using your iPhone, iPad, or iPod touch, but before blindly launching the Web site, this app performs a security scan on the URL. Trusted sites launch immediately, shortened URLs are lengthened so you can inspect the source before visiting, and you can access a full report for any blocked sites by tapping the rating icon.

Pocket MPG Lite





A fuel-efficient car might be good for the environment, but the benefits are most noticeable at the pump. James Poole's Pocket MPG Lite is a free app that lets you look

up the city, highway, and combined MPG ratings for more than 600 vehicle makes and models. Use this handy app when choosing a rental, buying fleet vehicles, or when shopping for a new or used car. To tap into this database, you do not need an Internet connection, and once you've found an MPG rating you like, you can quickly add it to your favorites list by tapping the top-right corner of the screen.

App Of The Month

Master Key





Password managers are only useful if you use them, but Hung Tran has made Master Key (\$4.99) versatile enough that you'll want it on your first Home screen. Master Key lets you store the details of your personal financial accounts and online identity, such as passwords, account numbers, usernames, PINs, credit card information, and more. Features include a dot pattern-based login scheme, 256-bit AES (Advanced Encryption Standard), preinstalled templates various types of data, and integration

with Dropbox, which lets you backup and restore your sensitive information at will. You can also configure the app to wipe itself after several multiple failed unlock attempts.

Scan To Spreadsheet

iPad iPhone iPod touch



Scan To Spreadsheet (\$2.99) from Berry Wing LLC is a quick and easy way to inventory virtually anything that has a barcode attached to it. You can cre-

ate new categories to denote the type of inventory you're performing, configure the app to add each new scanned item to a new row on a spreadsheet, and add notes and quantities that describe the items you're scanning. When you're finished scanning, sending a resulting XML (Extensible Markup Language) or CSV (Comma Separated Value) file as an email attachment is as simple as tapping the email icon at the bottom of the screen.

TurboText



This free time-saving app from Uber Touch lets you respond to messages with your own preset messages by



quickly tapping the response you want without having to access the on-screen keyboard at all. Create messages such as, "I'll call you right back," "I'm running late, hold my seat," and "Can't talk right now, please send me an email." When you get a message, either from iPhone SMS (Short Message Service) or from iOS 5's iMessage application, just access Turbo Text, select the canned response you want, and send it along. You can input additional text before you send the message, and you can add, edit, remove, and rearrange your favorite messages.

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Business Apps For Android & Windows Phone 7

Some powerful business tools are floating in the sea of smartphone apps. Each month, we'll highlight some of the best ones for Windows Phone 7 and Android platform users. (Unless otherwise noted, Windows Phone 7 apps are available in the Windows Phone Marketplace, and you'll find Android apps in the Android Market).



Yivosoft Recorder

Windows Phone 7

Yivosoft Recorder (\$1.99) is an audio recording app that lets you make short audio recordings for reminders, to do lists, and more. The intuitive interface lets you record a new message by tapping Record and listen by tapping Play. You can also access all of your messages by swiping to the Search menu. Press and hold your finger on a recording to edit the title, add comments, and more. With the Easy Sync Desktop software, you can sync your recordings to your PC over the Internet, Wi-Fi, or via a USB cable.

Thumba Photo Editor

Windows Phone 7

These days, it's not uncommon to leave your digital camera at home because




your smartphone's camera is just as good, but to take your smartphone images to the next level, try the Thumba Photo Editor (99 cents). This app lets you resize, crop, flip, rotate, add borders, fix red-eye, and warp your images in fun ways. Other settings include auto contrast, normalize, brightness, hue and saturation, color balance, remove noise, and many more. The app also makes it easy to share your mobile masterpieces on Facebook, Twitter, and Flickr.

Connectivity Shortcuts

Windows Phone 7

Battery life is everything for smartphone users, and we all know




that wireless radios have a big impact on it. Connectivity Shortcuts is a handy little free app that lets you pin on/off switches for your various wireless radios right to your Start screen. There's a button for Wi-Fi, Bluetooth, Cellular, and Airplane Mode. When you launch the app, tapping any of the icons takes you to the corresponding settings page, but tap and hold your finger to add the shortcut to your Start screen, so you can dramatically improve the phone's usage time.

MyBackup Pro

Android

We're advocates for backing up your data whenever possible, and your smartphone is no exception. MyBackup Pro (\$4.99) lets you quickly create backups of your phone data, including applications, images, contacts, call logs, browser bookmarks, SMS (Short Message Service) and MMS (Multimedia Message Service) messages, calendar entries, system settings, Home screen shortcuts,



alarms, music playlists, and more. You can create a backup on an SD (Secure Digital) card or to RerWare's servers for safe keeping. You can also schedule regular backups, remotely trigger backups from the Web (Android 2.2 or newer), and restore your backups on a new or existing phone.

JuiceDefender Ultimate

Android

Battery life on powerful smartphones is always at a premium. With JuiceDefender Ultimate from Latedroid (\$4.99), however, it doesn't have to be. This power-saving app gives you extensive control over the biggest drains on your battery life, namely the 3G/4G cellular radio and Wi-Fi radio. Features include location-aware Wi-Fi controls; the ability to set usage schedules, such as night, peak, and weekend; and the option to force 2G/3G/4G network mode. And as long as your phone supports it, JuiceDefender Ultimate can tweak the CPU frequency, display brightness, and more.



The Penguin Partition Linux for Human Beings

With all of the major changes that have taken place in Linux these last few weeks, it has been a scramble for the penguinista programmers to keep up. Just two

examples: everybody has had to wrap themselves around new versions of the Linux kernel, and rewrite everything for

the new GNOME 3 desktop. Admittedly, the kernel change was just an adjustment of the versioning scheme, but the GNOME 3 desktop required everyone to rewrite to utilize the new features and recompile to the new libraries.

Results have been mixed, with Ubuntu going their own way

with their Unity interface (released before GNOME 3 went gold) leaving all the distros based on Ubuntu scrambling to figure out which path they should take.

My favorite distro, Linux Mint came through with what is certainly the best implementation of GNOME 3 yet. Rather than decide between the new interface and their old interface, a Windoze-like menuing system, they actually implemented both. This way, you don't have to

decide which to use. You can either go to the traditional menus or go to the new icon-based method of navigation. After using this for a few weeks, there are many things I like about the new interface, but habit sometimes sends me to the traditional location of the desktop for the start button. The logic structures of the two interfaces are very



similar, so regardless of which you use, the same things are usually found in the same (logical) place.

The icon-based interface of GNOME 3 is doubtless influenced by tablet and Smartphone interfaces, and is a preview of what Microsoft calls its "tile-based" interface for Windows 8. (Blame

the "tile" vocabulary on Microsoft's NIH (Not Invented Here) culture, which discourages using vocabulary invented by someApple else on the non-Microsoft iPad.)

Linux being what it is, we can expect to see several expressions of the new GNOME 3 interface. Some will be opaque and some will be brilliant. There is an interesting year coming up.

Main Meeting Highlights

December 2, 2011

The meeting was called to order at 7:37 p.m. by President Chuck Horner. Harold Smith at the ticket table has 3" x 5" cards to write questions for discussion/answers at the end of the Meeting. We have two first-time visitors.

Del Parton described the current Clubhouse facility, which is in a two-car garage. They are setting up and have their electricity and other infrastructure in. They are currently short of monitors and are looking for donations, preferably flat-screens.

SIG Announcements:

The Hardware SIG has been canceled tomorrow night.

The Windows 7 SIG will meet at Bud Gallagher's at 1 p.m. on the 10th, the customary second Saturday after the main meeting.

The Spectacular Linux SIG will look at the Linux Mint 12 distribution. Mint has done a better job than Ubuntu in creating a user-friendly interface. The SIG will not meet Christmas Eve or New Years Eve. Stay tuned for 'December' date clarification. Be sure you're on Jan's e-mail list if you want to get updates.

Mobile SIG is on vacation over the holidays and will start again the 3rd Monday in January.

Go to the PCC Web site if you want to contact a SIG leader and/or ask to be put on a mailing list to get information for a specific SIG.

Nominations for the Board of Directors election were closed. Ballots were distributed and explained. Diane George and Del Parton volunteered to count votes.

Presentations: Diane George presented Ultrabooks, which have specifications defined by Intel.

Intel has invested heavily in development of Ultrabooks, small light competitors to tablets.

Intel is further optimizing future generations of processors for this platform. Ultrabooks have SSD drives, which are typically smaller than those of current laptops. With successive developments, the Ultrabooks will use less and less power. Diane will put the PowerPoint of this presentation on the PCC Website. You will find several links to sites with ongoing updated information about ultrabooks.

One advantage of SSD is that they are instant-on. On the other hand, SSD memory is still relatively expensive.

David Graham pointed out that battery memory improves with "indexing." Indexing means to charge the battery fully and run it down to 10 % three times in succession.

The question came up about whether or not it is safe to move a laptop while it is on. Diane pointed out that because an SSD (Solid State drive) has no moving parts, the risk is less than with a mechanical hard drive. It is also better to unplug a laptop and let the battery run down to 10% occasionally.

After the break Chuck announced the 2012 PCC Board of Directors. They are: Jan Fagerholm, Sally Holt, Chuck Horner, Elsie Smith, and Bayle Emlein.

Why, asked Jan Fagerholm, are we suddenly seeing Ultrabooks? Look at the tablet market: No Intel tablets. Intel is running to catch up in the market place. After the processors have been modified to use less power in future generations, battery life will be less disappointing.

Jan showed a Windows Tablet that has a tab interface similar to upcoming Windows 8. One can download EasyBits to try out the interface.

Sally mentioned a TigerDirect Black Friday sale that included a tablet and a computer. If they have something you want, these sales are worth the trouble of following sites and newspaper announcements.

On his Android phone, Chuck has been using an app called GoRequest for Hayward community access. He uses ColorNote for a notepad. He also has a voice recorder app and is enjoying the app for his local newspaper. Everyone appreciated the spray-can graffiti app. Chuck liked QuickOffice on the Palm platform and is looking forward to trying it out in Android.

Jan acknowledge Chuck's contributions to the community, which were recognized by Chuck's designation as a
