

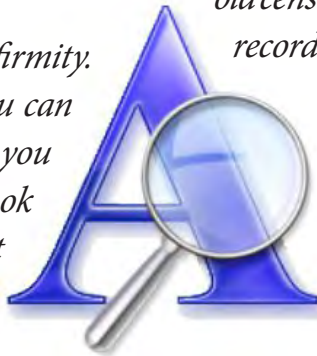
Your Computer Made Easy

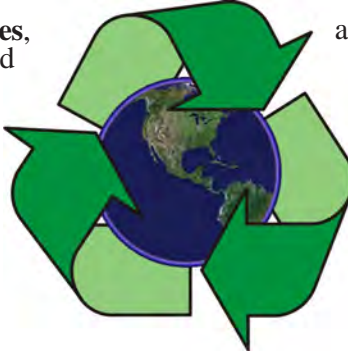

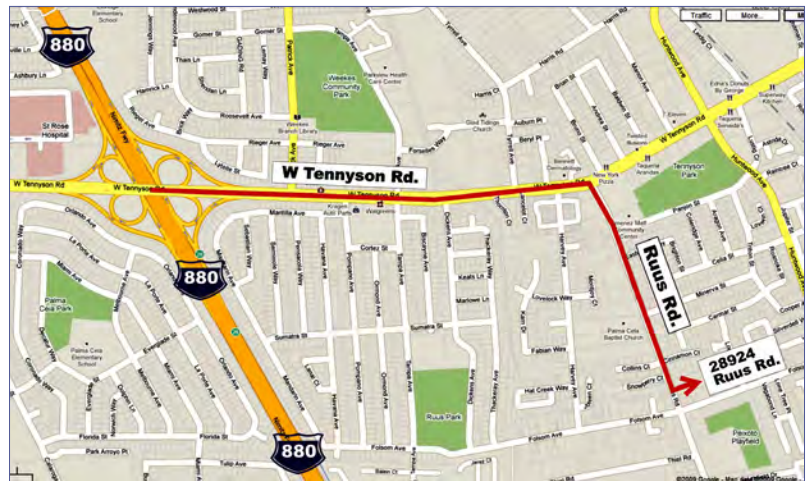
Directions to the PCC Main Meeting

REMOVE STUBBORN BUGS

If a virus slips past your computer's defenses, it's time to roll up your sleeves and go after the bug yourself. Each month, we tell you how to remove some of the most disruptive malware on the Internet.

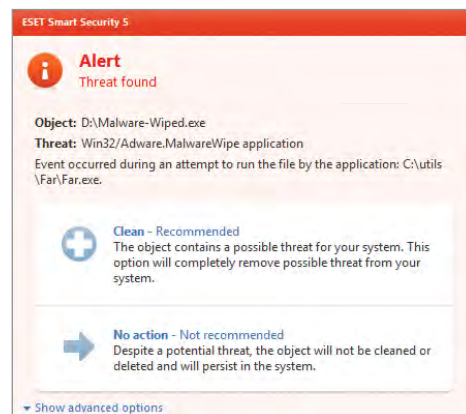
MALWAREWIPE/ PESTTRAP

DESCRIPTION: Few malicious software infections are more annoying than adware and spyware. MalwareWipe and PestTrap are classic examples, as they pepper you with urgent instructions to pay money to remove alleged virus and spyware infections. These “infections” are actually files that have been falsely flagged as malicious by MalwareWipe and PestTrap. To better drive home these phony sales pitches, both programs have the ability to pester you with false warnings about the malware infections on your machine, sometimes using an “always on top” alert window that you can't minimize. MalwareWipe and PestTrap are also capable of sneaky background activity, such as monitoring your Internet access, hijacking your Web browser, and changing system files—all without your knowledge or permission.

How To Remove MalwareWipe/PestTrap

You'll need to use an Internet security suite that offers virus and spyware protection, such as ESET's Smart Security 5 (price starts at \$59.99 per year for one PC; www.eset.com). If you suspect your system has been infected by either of these programs, simply run a scan with ESET Smart Security, which will identify the threat and automatically remove the malicious software from your system.

To launch an antivirus scan with ESET Smart Security 5, go to the ESET Smart Security control panel and select Computer scan. You can select either Smart scan or Custom scan. If you need to run a scan immediately and don't have an antivirus program installed, you can use ESET's Free Online Virus Scan (www.eset.com/online-scanner) that works through your Web browser. Companies experiencing persistent and widespread infection by MalwareWipe, PestTrap, or any other malware may want to consider ESET's Malware Removal service (www.eset.com/us/business/services).



ESET Smart Security 5 can be configured to notify you when threats are found during a scan, and with MalwareWipe, you'd see a window such as this one.



Windows 8 Pains 'n' Gains

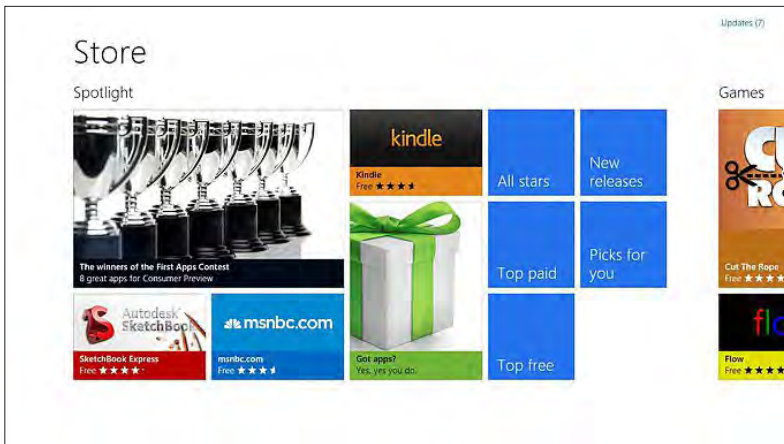
What Did They Do To My [Your App Here]?

Windows 8

News Flash – Microsoft called a big press conference and announced that they are on track for the previously announced 4Q 2012 release of Windows 8. I don't know why they think this is "news" except for the fact that Microsoft rarely makes a scheduled delivery date. While Consumer Preview on x86/x64 is surprisingly polished

given us the ability to hide it if you don't want the screen clutter. It remembers the state you left it in and starts that way subsequently. It is always available through the tiny carat at the right end of the Menu bar. The Menu bar itself has become a Tab bar with the menu headings being the titles of the tabs. Click the tab and the Ribbon appears displaying the functions for that tab.

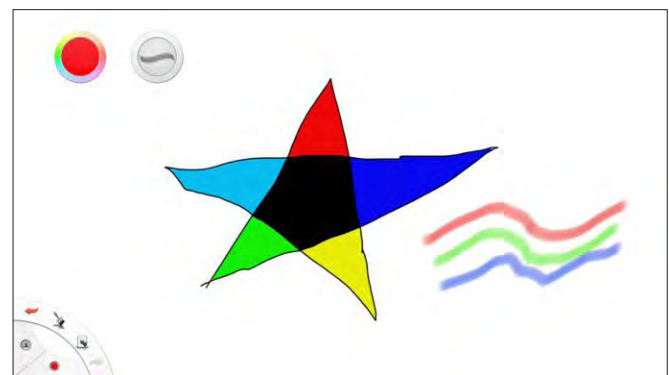
for a beta, Rumor Central has it that the ARM processor version is still pretty convoluted. This is to be expected, as Microsoft has very little experience programming on that platform, but one wonders if the ARM version will get relegated to the TBA (To Be Announced) category at the time that the Intel/AMD version is released. That would be too bad, as inclusion of the ARM platform was originally a major part of the plan for Windows 8.

Windows 8 Consumer Preview has been with us a few weeks now, and provides us with a fairly accurate view of what the final release will look like.

Living with Windows 8 Consumer Preview on a laptop computer has brought to light some of the changes that Microsoft has in mind for "regular" Windows. In no particular order, here goes:

Interface changes: On the conventional desktop, the Ribbon toolbar has come to rule. You may or may not have had exposure to the Ribbon, but I will take the opportunity to overexplain it a bit here. Previously, we have seen the Ribbon in MS Office 2007 and 2010: in Windows Vista and 7, it only crept into a few Windows accessories. In Windows 8 it is nearly everywhere. Love it or hate it, Microsoft has decided that it is the future for desktop Windows. This is not as onerous as it sounds, though, as along the way Microsoft has listened to The Rest Of Us and

Metro: Windows 8 Consumer Preview comes populated with several Metro Tiles. Many Windows Accessories, such as Windows Explorer and Internet Explorer, simply have Tiles (Shortcuts) that launch the expected desktop application. Some have dual personalities: launch Control Panel from the Start menu in the desktop and you get the familiar Windows 7 Control Panel interface. From Metro, invoke the Start menu the same way and you get different choices, among them More PC Settings. Start this, and you get a Metro-ized and simplified selection of Control Panel items which perform the same functions that they do in desktop Control Panel. A notable addition is the ability to personalize the login screen, a welcome addition which I presently enjoy in Linux. (Now, if OS-X would only get on the bandwagon. . .) At some juncture, I would hope that Metro will receive the same personalization features, but so far we are stuck with the retro Windows 95 teal-colored background.

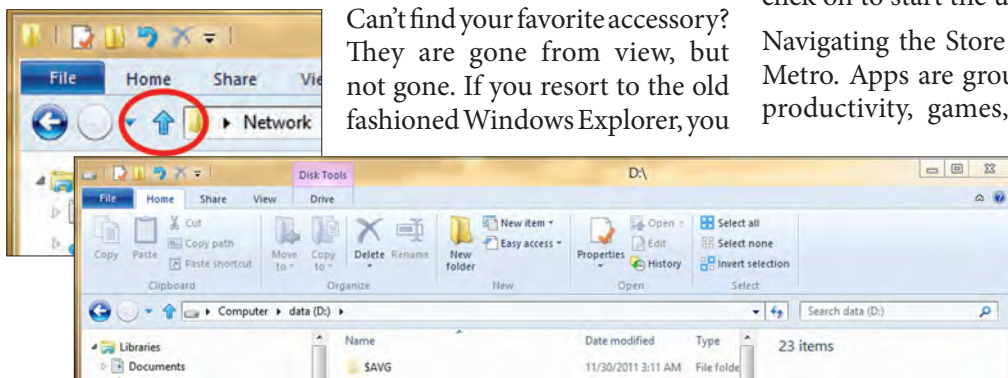


Autodesk Sketchbook Express - drawing simplified

A distinguishing feature of Metro apps is that they run full screen only. This is doubtless a nod toward tablet hardware which has both smaller screens and more modest graphics hardware. Running full screen only eliminates the need for a window manager (the piece of software that draws the window on the screen and formats the application's contents to fit). Lacking a window manager and a taskbar

leads to the thumbnail-style method of switching between apps that Metro employs.

Many of the Windows accessories have been Metro-ized. Windows Media Player has been split into two Metro apps; Video and Music. Outlook Express is now the Mail apps. Windows Messenger is replaced by Messaging. Remote Desktop is – Remote Desktop: It is easier to connect with than the old version. The main difference is that these accessories get the Metro facelift. Functionally, they are much the same.



Can't find your favorite accessory? They are gone from view, but not gone. If you resort to the old fashioned Windows Explorer, you

will find most of them in the same places they have always been. (Most of them are in \Windows\System32.)

Speaking of Windows Explorer, it has two big changes: the aforementioned Ribbon interface, and what you could call, "Return Of The Up Button". While Vista removed the "up one directory" button from the toolbar, Windows 8 brings it back, distancing Explorer from its previous "works like the Mac" navigation.

New Metro apps include Reader, which displays most ebook formats and PDF as well. (Exception here is .mobi format.) There is also a Camera app and a companion Photos app to manage photographs.

Living with Metro for awhile, I find that navigating Metro's Start is even easier than Android or iPad. It is one continuous desktop that scrolls horizontally by a variety of methods, making navigation easy. This differs from Android or iPad, which group things into multiple desktops, and you scroll from desktop to desktop. There is also an All Apps view available that thumbnails the Tiles and organizes them by function. Finally, there is a small button on the lower right corner of the screen that zooms out and lets you see the entire Start desktop at once. All of this is navigable by either touch, mouse, or keyboard.

Apps Store – One of the areas where Microsoft is playing catch-up is in launching an online apps store. Of course,

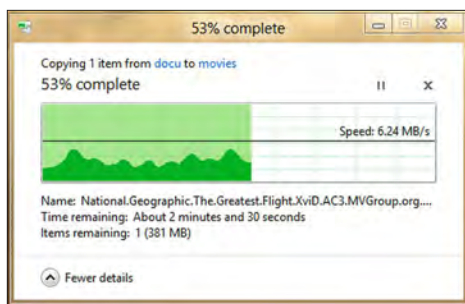
there is a Tile in Metro to go there – it is simply called "Store". Not surprisingly, the Store screen looks a lot like the Metro Start screen when you get there. There is very little indication that you are on line when you enter the store. This is as intended, as one of the things that Metro does is blur the distinction between your local device and an online location. The Store Tile updates itself, like other Tiles, and notifies you of available updates to your installed apps. Enter the Store, and there is a notification area in the upper right corner of the screen that you can click on to start the update process.

Navigating the Store is virtually identical to navigating Metro. Apps are grouped in a logical fashion; free, pay, productivity, games, etc. There is no precise way to determine the number of apps available, but browsing the Store appears to put it in the dozens, rather than the thousands available for Android and iOS. This will certainly change with time, as Microsoft is presently paying outside developers to create apps for Store. One standout is Autodesk's SketchBook Express, a vector drawing program brought over from iOS. On the anti-productivity side, try Pew Pew, an Asteroids-like game done graphically like a pencil sketch.

Nits: No instruction manual or Hints in Metro. Poke it and see what happens is the norm for these tablet style interfaces, but there are many features that don't present themselves by poking, like how do you create a Tile (shortcut) in Metro Start for a pre-existing application? (answer: navigate to the program's executable in Windows Explorer, right click on it, and click "Pin to Start" from the menu.)

Picks: Copy operations (and others) that display a progress window have a link or button that offers to display more information on the progress of the operation. I'm a geek, so I always want to see more information. Previous versions of Windows always default to the simple view and you always have to click to see more information. Windows 8 remembers the view you used last and starts with that view. (Why did it take this long for Microsoft to allow the user to make this choice?)

Now that we can see and use Metro apps, it is clearer how Microsoft is modernizing Windows toward the current trend in personal devices for connectivity, social networking, and cloud presence. More about this later.

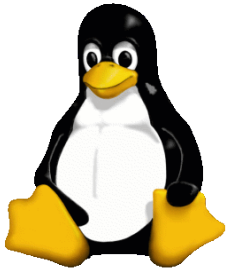

The Spectacular Linux SIG meets at 2 p.m. on the last Saturday of the month, April 28. The topic is still undecided. There are a lot of new things in the works so there may be late-breaking developments and Jan is open to suggestions and requests.

Presentation:

Jan Fagerholm demonstrated XBMC, a Linux distribution media center based on Ubuntu. In the past decade, the price for the equipment to set up a home multi-media center has dropped by about 90% and it has gotten much simpler also, thanks in part to improved wireless technology. Digital displays can scan at a true 60 frames per second, rather than the 30 frames per second of interlaced CRT's. The group enjoyed a fine evening of music and film demonstrating

the audio and video qualities and organization capabilities of XBMC.

One can download the XBMC software. It's Linux. It's free. It's strongly suggested that you store your multi-media on a dedicated box. Search for "media center PC" to identify shopping options and select among the many vendors.

Questions:

To solve problems with ads taking up time and space on AT&T by Yahoo Web mail add the Adblock extension to Firefox. There is an Internet Explorer version.

What's the best resolution for HDMI connection between a computer and TV? Use the default.

Why can't I copy graphics from some e-mails in forwarding? Copying capability depends on the graphic. Some images are graphics within the document and some are a link to a Web site. You can always download an image and save to the desktop.

How important is a recovery disk? It matters only if you want to see Windows again after a crash. Some computers have a built-in option to create a recovery disk. Don Odle reported that Easeus creates a recovery software option, at www.easeus.com. It is offered at our favorite price: free.

Has anyone had trouble using Quicken to download Wells Fargo banking information? Web sites don't like older versions of Quicken. It may be that Cookies are not being saved so that access information must be re-entered each time.

Someone sent me a .mov file: How do I view it? Download Quicktime from the Apple Web site. Uncheck the iTunes download that's included with the download. (Or install Linux, which will play all formats.)
