

## Free Up Hard Drive Space

Free up space by backing up some of your larger personal files to disc and then deleting the data from your PC.

omputer applications and operating systems can be messy creatures. Each time you start them, they leave behind a few small files that are a partial record of the work you've done. The leftover files allow the operating system to reference the data to deliver faster performance the next time it performs the same task. In addition, your PC's storage devices

are also likely cluttered with "temporary" files that are created during a program's installation or removal process. When these orphaned files begin to accumulate, you'll have less storage space than you used to. Even worse, those junk files can slow down a hard drive (but not an SSD, or solid state drive), because it will become more difficult for a hard drive to locate specific data

requested by your computer. Here, we'll cover the maintenance tasks you can perform to clean up a PC's hard drive or SSD.


#### Disk Cleanup

This is a utility that's built into virtually all of Windows editions since XP, and it's designed to help you get rid of files that are likely no longer necessary. Disk Cleanup



searches the common areas where files build up in your computer, including Downloaded Program Files, Temporary Internet Files, and the Recycle Bin. To run Disk Cleanup in Windows 7, type Disk Cleanup into the Search field, and select Disk Cleanup. Windows 7 will then analyze the files on your PC and let you select the files you want to delete. Select the types of file you want to remove and click the OK button; this brings up a window that asks Are You Sure You Want To Permanently Delete These Files? Click Delete Files to finish the process.

For those running Windows 8, you can type Disk Cleanup and select it from the Search options. The utility will scan the drive and generate a Files To Do Delete list, which is a categorized inventory of the junk files



Disk Cleanup starts by scanning your PC to see how much space it can save you.

on your PC. To select or deselect a category, click the checkbox next to the listed option. Once you've selected all the files you want to remove, click OK. Then, select Delete Files from the Disk Cleanup window.


#### **Uninstall Programs**

In a bind for storage space on a PC? One of the easiest ways to free up capacity is by uninstalling applications you no longer use. To see a list of applications on your computer in Windows 7, click the Start button, select Control Panel, and choose Uninstall A Program under the Pro-


grams section. Scroll through the list of application to see if there are any programs that you can delete to free up space. When you find one, select it and click the Uninstall button.

There are two ways to remove applications in Windows 8. For programs that run in the Modern UI, right-click the application you want to delete and a check will appear on it. Select the Uninstall option at the bottom of the screen. For applications that operate in the Windows Explorer view, open Windows Explorer, select Computer, and ensure the ribbon is maximized. Next, se-

Sort through your emails and get rid of those with extralarge attachments, if you no longer need the data.



lect Open Control Panel from the File menu and choose Uninstall A Program. Choose the application you want to delete, and click the Uninstall/Change button.

#### Back Up & Remove Old Files

Do you have a large collection of digital images to which you no longer need regular access? If your personal files are taking up too much space on your PC, consider investing in an external hard drive, and then transfer that data to the external drive as a convenient backup that you can access whenever you need to open the files. If your computer features a DVD or Blu-ray burner, you could also burn the files to disc. You may

even want to back up your most treasured files to both an external hard drive and disc, so you'll have a backup copy even if the other gets lost or fails. Once you've backed up the data, you can then delete it from your PC's hard drive—knowing that the data is safely stored on the external hard drive or disc.

#### Delete Duplicate Files

Over the years, you may have downloaded or created multiples of many files on your computer. For example, we recently found a large collection of duplicate images that we'd copied into a folder on our Desktop, so we could easily transfer them to a flash drive. The 20MB folder no longer served any purpose,

but we'd forgotten to delete the duplicate copy after transferring the data. Examine your PC's folders for extra copies that may be occupying valuable hard drive space. Some third-party utilities will find and list duplicate files for you.

#### **Email Attachments**

If your friends, colleagues, and clients send you emails with large attachments that you save elsewhere, it may no longer be necessary to save the original emails—or at least not the attachments that accompanied them. Most email clients offer a way to sort your emails by size, so you can quickly determine which ones are taking up the most room on your system.

#### When To Upgrade Your Operating System

ith Windows 8's launch finally upon us, now is a great time to brush up on the lifecycle particulars of Microsoft's current and former operating systems. Microsoft has a 10-year minimum support plan for its operating systems: at least five years of mainstream support and five years of extended support. Now is the time to upgrade, if the operating systems you use are nearing the end of their lifecycle.

#### The End Is Nigh

Microsoft's operating systems all have two different expiry dates, End Of Sales and End

Of Support. The former refers to the point at which Microsoft stops shipping the particular version of Windows to OEMs (original equipmanufacturers) ment and retailers. Often, the retail End Of Sales dates occurs before the OEM one. According to Microsoft, you should begin thinking about upgrading if your OS has reached its End Of Sales

the latest service pack, you'll still get updates and security fixes.

There are actually two End Of Support dates.

The first occurs roughly five years after the op-

date, but as long as your operating system has

There are actually two End Of Support dates. The first occurs roughly five years after the operating system's launch. This period is called the mainstream support phase, and during it you can still request changes in product design and features, download free security updates and hotfixes, and get complimentary and paid support. When the mainstream support phase ends, the OS goes into its extended support phase, which eliminates complimentary support and

most hotfixes; however, security updates and paid support will continue until this phase ends. If your OS is in the extended support phase, then you should consider upgrading as soon as possible.



## The Penguin Partition Linux for Human Beings

If I say "Linux". you probably have a shape in mind. (No, penguin-shaped doesn't count.) I'm speaking of the ways and places you encounter Linux that you

may not even be aware of.

Fedora desktop.

In the progression of personal devices, I have adopted it on my laptop, my netbook, and my favorite notetaker the OLPC (One Laptop Pre Child) XO-1 machine. In addition to the touted Sugar interface, the X) machine boasts the ability to switch between the Sugar interface and a traditional

I've mentioned previously how embedded Linux is used in so many of our faceless appliances, but more recently it has become dominant with a different face in the most recent personal devices, smartphones and tablet computers. I'm speaking, of course, of Android.

We are accustomed to hearing about the iPhone's dominance in smartphones, but that is only in the U.S. Worldwide, Android smartphones outnumber iPhones, which accounts for Apple's nervousness (and recent court actions) against manufacturers of Android phones.

On the tablet computer front, Apple had a two year lead in the tablet market, but Google's development of Android on Linux has inspired a proliferation of devices that appeal to personalization on many more levels.

Where the first Android tablets were clear clones of the iPad, recent smaller and less expensive Android tablets have created their own market. Most obvious is

Amazon's original Kindle Fire, but their forking of the Android platform has caused Google to respond with its own "pure" small tablet, the Nexus. At one-fourth the price of the original iPad, it, and its many kin, are

flying off the shelves faster than they can be made. Android 4.1 (Jellybean) helps the experience by incorporating code optimization rather than feature creep. For the first time, Apple has been forced

to follow, rather than lead, with the introduction of the iPad Mini.

Behind all this frenzy is the new nVidia Tegra 3 CPU/VPU, which has substantial improvements in performance and power management over previous CPUs. These devices are also finding their way into the latest netbooks and laptops, creating a cross-platform experience not previously available.

Oh, yeah, and of course it all runs on Linux.

**Presentations:** Bob Gostischa from Avast! started his presentation by reviewing the basics: When you get a notice to update, assume it means that there was a security breach and act on it at your earliest opportunity. But do not click on buttons that claim to be a company you know. The Bad Guys have gotten very clever at imitating familiar, well-known sites.

Initiate contact yourself, via phone or email.

The basic summarized:

- » Update, don't wait
- » Don't be click happy
- » Passwords: make them strong, don't share, use a different one for each service
- » Gamers: keep security software on
- » Avoid P2P (peer to peer) and pirated software
- » Social engineering attacks are rampant
- » Not everyone is your friend
- » Public WiFi hotspots are public, don't bank or shop at Starbucks.

There are currently 2.1 billion internet users. With increasing use, risk increases. 85% of infections come directly from the internet. The other 15% come from removable media, email. Six out of 10 infections come from legitimate sites that have become compromised. Avast! will block customer access to infected Web sites. Avast! uses 10% of a computer's operating resources needed by Symantec, while finding threats and distributing cures faster. Avast! is now the leading anti-virus software, free or paid, worldwide.

New from Avast!: Android and smartphone protection. Avast also has a version for Mac and Linux, but no iPhone/Pod/Pad as of tonight's meeting.

Free versions of Avast! are for home user. Corporate users buy the Endpoint Protection Suite. Bob recommends the Internet version, which is more inclusive and worth the small additional cost.

Bob will be sending a file with links to information he presented. Check the PCC Website for the links.
